



# Walkable Warren

Walkable Warren is a local initiative intended to promote healthy lifestyles by encouraging foot travel and bicycling as alternative modes of travel in and around the City of Warren. Warren has a wealth of scenic landscapes, historic architecture, public parks, and trails, all worthy of being showcased and that are best experienced on foot or by bicycle. Recommended routes of travel between the Warren/North Warren Bike/Hike trail, core downtown and a few of our public parks are marked by Walkable Warren signage along our public streets. We encourage you to step out of the automobile as a source of travel, and instead, experience Walkable Warren on foot or by bicycle. Pedestrians should use the sidewalks. Bicyclists must obey all traffic laws.

### MAP ROUTE OF CELORON (CELERON) de BLAINVILLE

In 1749 the French sent Celoron (Celoron) de Blainville down the Allegheny and Ohio Rivers as a show of force to the British. Celoron buried lead plates at major river junctions along the way as proof of French ownership. The map shows Lake Erie and the route down the Allegheny, Ohio, and the Maumee Rivers and back to Lake Erie



### POINT PARK

“The Point” is an 11-acre site, purchased under Project 70, a state grant funding program, and located at the confluence of the Conewango Creek and the Allegheny River. While it has never been found, historic records indicate that in 1749 Celoron (Celoron) buried a leaden marker at the confluence of the Conewango Creek and Allegheny River to re-establish the French claim to the region.

This painting displays Celoron (Celoron) at one of the several major river junctions during the 1749 “Lead Plate Expedition” to advance France’s territorial claim along the Allegheny and Ohio rivers.



French Territorial claims on Western Pennsylvania in the late 1740's. To enforce the French claims an expedition was led by Celoron (Celoron) in 1749. Leaden plagues were buried in several locations along the Allegheny River officially claiming the lands for King Louis XV of France.
